3D ARCHERY RETURNS TO CHAPTER

This month, we are interviewing Rick Thompson, our Chapters new Archery Manager. Rick has only been with our chapter for a few months, and already he has stepped into a leadership role as our Archery Manager and as a Director on our Chapter Board.

JLB: A question that I always ask is: How did you learn about the Fort Wayne Chapter?

RT: My wife and I were looking for a an Archery range and someone told us that the IWLA chapter used to have an active Archery program, so we drove out and were impressed with the potential that we saw.

JLB: Rick, what got you into the sport of archery?

RT: Actually, I've been involved since I was a youngster. Growing up, I hunted with family, using bows rather than rifles or shotgun.

JLB: Is your wife an Archer too?

RT: Yes she is.

JLB: Do you two compete against each other?

RT: Sometimes, but just for fun though, not in organized competition.

JLB: Is the Archery Shooting Sport

still popular? Some have said that it might be a dying sport.

RT: I think that the Compound Bow and the Crossbow have a lot to do with the renewed popularity. The recent Covid pandemic also created interest, with families having been cooped up, resulted in their looking for something that could be enjoyed in the outdoors.

JLB: What does a person need to get started in archery?

RT: It is more than just buying a bow at a garage sale. A properly fitted bow with appropriate draw length and pull weight accommodating their body strength and height is important.

JLB: Is this an expensive hobby?

RT: It can be, but with patience and care in selection, it needn't be. You will need to invest in archery gear, find a place to practice and importantly, seek some archery lessons. This may sound expensive, but archery doesn't have to be pricey.

If you're on a budget, basic traditional archery is a cost-effective and enjoyable way to get started. Compound bows are becoming evermore popular, and are slightly more expensive than

traditional equipment. Fortunately, improvements in technology, compound bows are very accurate and coming down in price. An archery store can get you outfitted with a compound bow that is surprisingly inexpensive.

A beginner archer's budget should also include archery lessons. We have static targets on our IWLA range for our members and this is a good way to start. As to lessons, seek group lessons rather than



private ones

JLB: How has bow technology changed over the years?

RT: There are a variety of bow types, The 4 bow types in modern archery are recurve bow, compound bow, longbow and finally the crossbow.

JLB: Do you shoot more than one style bow, or have you settled on just one?

RT: I use compound, crossbow, and I'm currently venturing back into traditional bow shooting.

JLB: Tell us a little about 3D archery at the Fort Wayne Chapter.



RT: Our 3D shoots are pen to the public as well as members and 3D Archery is a fun way to get family and friends together. We have 21 different animal targets that are life sized and placed throughout IWL property. There is a nominal fee of \$10 per person and children 12 and under are free.

JLB: What do you think about the quality of the Izaak Walton archery range and 3D equipment?

RT: We offer an outstanding 3D range and practice target range including the new crossbow practice target area. While we are a membership organization, we offer 3D archery that is open to the public.



JLB: Do you plan to offer Archery classes at Izaak Walton?

RT: Perhaps, if there is enough people interested. If interested, send me an email at rlthomp-son76@yahoo.com and we'll see what level of interest in lessons may be out there.

JLB: As we close this interview, do you have any thoughts that you'd like to share and that we might not have covered in our interview?

RT: I want to mention that the Fort Wayne Chapter offers 3D Shoots the 3rd Saturday every Month from March to September.

JLB: Rick, on behalf of the Fort Wayne Chapter, let me express how much we appreciate your stepping forward to lead our Archery program.

RT: I'm excited to be a part of Archery at the Izaak Walton Chapter. Interest is growing, as more hear about our 3D range and our goal is to get our Archery members involved again and to gain new members in the process.





FROM THE PRESIDENTS DESK

Recently our chapter held one of its most important meetings as we met to determine who manages our facility for the next year. At the Spring meeting, all members were allowed to nominate individuals, or to personally step up for the most critical offices in the Chapter: President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer. The individuals nominated and elected are designated as the legal representatives in the eyes of both state and federal government.

Our Chapter owns approximately 270 acres of land dominated by the Cedar Creek Corridor, much of which has been bequeathed to our Chapter by others to maintain a legacy for others in the future. We are responsible for maintaining the landscape in a pristine fashion, as nature intended, so that it will be available for many years to come. We also have unique opportunities available for both members and guests like our rifle and pistol ranges, our trap and skeet facilities, our fishing pond and our miles of nature trails that meander through ancient glacier formed woodland. But, management and maintenance of all of this is accomplished by the same ten percent of our membership year-over-year. We have no salaried staff.

One would think that several individuals would be interested in guiding the fortunes of a chapter that has been in existence since 1924. Sadly, that has not been the case in recent years, and I wonder why? Our chapter is one of the largest in the state of Indiana with a multitude of amenities available to our members to enjoy throughout the year. In addition, our membership is comprised of individuals who represent a wide variety of industries and experience that is second to none. But there is a decided lack of sharing this knowledge in the management of our chapter.

One would think that many individuals would want to be a part of the team that monitors and controls all aspects of the facility known as the Izaak Walton League of America Fort Wayne Chapter, but you would be incorrect. The question is: "Why don't our members run for office when election season arises?" I can postulate many theories regarding only a few individuals are willing to assume this responsibility over multiple terms, but I would be making assumptions which may be incorrect.

A NEW COMPETITION TO CONSIDER

If you're like most individuals, you probably enjoy some level of competition. Whether in a Board Game or in the neighbor's back yard, we all enjoyed competing as youngsters. While not always intense competition, it gave bragging rights to those participating. Maybe it was who was the best in a pick-up game, the best student, and many times the best behaved in public.

As we grew up, competition began to take on many different facets. Competition for affection of another person, competition for a job or promotion and friendly competition in the world of sports. With that being said, we've attempted to introduce some competition on our Rifle Range for those in our Chapter who enjoy marksmanship with a .22LR rifle. Alas, our first efforts to date have been a failure.

We attempted to introduce "Rimfire Silhouette" competition last spring and it never got off the ground. The primary complaint was the inability to practice the course of fire. Our course design made practicing extremely difficult and time consuming. It was a grand idea, that failed to catch on, but we're not giving up.


We're now introducing a new challenge for the average .22LR enthusiast from the American Rimfire Association. The competition is simple in that it requires .22 caliber rifle, one box of 50-rounds of ammunition, and two paper targets placed at 50-yards downrange.

The rules are simple:

- 1. A .22 caliber rifle with a MSRP of less the \$1250.00 in purchase price and may be Semi-automatic, Pump or Bolt action.
- 2. Shooting is done from a benchrest. Front rest (bipod) and rear bag allowed. No connecting lead-sled style is allowed. Ours style is considered by ARA as "Factory Class" competition.
- 3. Targets are IBS paper targets each containing 25 bullseye circles. One shot is fired into each circle and its position on target determines a score of 1 to 10 points. The maximum score for each target circle is 10 points. Total points available on each IBS complete target is 250 points.
- 4. The time limit to shoot the total 25 circles is 20-minutes.
- Each match will consist of shooting two individual IBS target sheets. The total of both score sheets will determine the winner. In the event of a tie, the shooter with the most "Dead Center", known as 10X scores, will be the winner.

Attached is a photo of an IBS target tested recently. To make practicing simple and inexpensive, a packet of IBS targets are inside the RSO shack. The cost is 2 for \$1.00.

The hope is this will become an enjoyable competition that will appeal to all who enjoy shooting a .22 caliber rifle. Only time and interest will tell if this competition will catch on.


