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INTERVIEWING CHARITA

"Lady Of The Outdoors"

This month we are interviewing Charita Niedermeyer, a member of the FW Chapter of IWLA. I have known Charita for a number of years and she is a most interesting person in the Conservation & Shooting Sports world, as you are about to learn. We tracked her down at the 2023 Women In The Outdoors event being held at our Chapter. We found her figuratively climbing on her horse and riding off in six different directions at once, as Chairman of this event.

JLB: Good afternoon, Charita. It's always a pleasure to chat with you and we appreciate your taking a few moments away from this unique venture referred to as WITO. That's an acronym isn't it? CN: Hi Jay! Yes, WITO (pronounced "weetoe") is the acronym we use in the NWTF world (National Wild Turkey Federation) for our Women in the Outdoors outreach program. A lot quicker and easier to say!

JLB: Gotcha! Charita, I had belonged to our local chapter for several years and I just assumed that this joint venture between the Allen County chapter of the National Wild Turkey Federation and the Izaak Walton League was a common event held by the two organizations nationwide, but as it turns out, this relationship is somewhat unique. Am I right?

CN: WITO events across the country, as with any of the NWTF's outreach programs, are held at various locations. They could be held at someone's house or farmland, conservation clubs, business locations, DNR, state, or federal land areas.

JLB: I looked up Andrew's membership records and he has been an IWLA member since Sept 2006. Have you been a member of the Fort Wayne chapter all of that time as well, or did you guys take out a family membership somewhere

along the way?

CN: When Andrew signed up, he signed up for a family membership. We both shoot and hunt, so it made the most sense and I could go out to the chapter on my own, when he was tied up.

JLB: How long has our chapter been doing this joint effort and how did it come about?

CN: 2006 was our first event. Between possibly using the Girl Scout camp next door and IWLA, we had hoped one of them would take the bait, and Izaak came through for us! There used to be an event put on by the IN DNR in this area pre-2006 called BOW (Becoming an Outdoor Woman) that was held at both the Girl Scouts camp next door and Izaak Walton. Well, the DNR stopped doing that event in this area and there was still a need for a similar type event. I was approached by the regional WITO coordinator at the time, due to me being very active in my local NWTF chapter, to see if I'd be interested in taking on the (major) task of starting up an event for this area. Fast forward pushing 20 years, here we still are!

JLB: And you and Andrew are members of both chapters, is that right?

CN: Yes, we joined the IWLA and NWTF as members way back in the early 2000s.

JLB: My impression is that WITO attendees can choose from a cafeteria

menu of different events. Is that correct and if so, how many are offered in this event going on around us?

CN: WITO event attendees pre-register and pay a registration fee, and that includes a 1 year NWTF membership and magazine, 4 classes of their choice, and a light breakfast and lunch. We typically have 24 classes offered each year, broken down into time blocks of 6 classes (4 sessions). Each class is 2hrs. long.

JLB: Tell us about some of the most popular events being offered this year.

CN: Our shooting (firearms and archery) classes are always big hits every year at our events, which is why we always include those in our choices of classes, and sometimes even offering advanced classes. After that, our next most popular classes include camping, hiking or survival of the fittest type classes—outdoor cooking, camping, wilderness survival/first aid type classes, backpacking, self defense, and any type of gardening, wild edibles and similar.

JLB: Are these events the same every year?

CN: Definitely not. As mentioned, we always make sure we offer shooting classes (archery, gun), but the other 80% are usually either new classes, or classes we only bring back every couple or few years. Since we have been doing this event for so long, and tend to have some repeat attendees, it is very important that we try our best to keep classes as fresh as possible to keep some of our alumnus coming back!

JLB: So they are more than just sports shooting of shotguns, bow & amp; arrow, and small-bore rifle?

CN: Yes, but we make sure that the majority of our classes offered are outdoors based.

JLB: How do you locate and sign on the subject matter experts for these classes?

CN: It can be a tricky beast! Not an easy task finding "qualified/decent" and available instructors! It takes a few months for our committee to come up with classes and instructors for that year's event.

Most of them are word of mouth or have taught at our event in prior years.

JLB: I notice that your rifle instructors are wearing Indiana Department of Natural Resources uniforms. Are they the same one's year after year, and if so, what draws them back as instructor/coaches?

CN: No, not always. Just depends on which IN Conservation Officers are available to teach at our event that day. They typically will teach our Firearms Safety

class, any rifle and pistol classes—basic and advanced, and lately our Self Defense class as well. They also will sometimes assist with the archery classes.

JLB: The FW Chapter normally has a requirement that we use our own certified Range Officers for classes like this one offered, but this WITO program has been around longer than our Chapter's certified RSO program, and we share your confidence in your coaches, so we make an exception, which is very rare.

CN: The NWTF really promotes having a "working" relationship with our state agencies (DNR) and partners when it comes to outreach programs. So, this is why we have continually relied on them for some of our classes each year. I also think it's very important for the "general public" to have a good rapport for officers, especially in this day and age! And for our muzzleloading class, we always use an instructor who is with 4H Shooting Sports but also with the Indiana Hunter Ed. Association.

JLB: Charita, you, Andrew, and I attended an IDNR R ³ Summit a couple of years ago, and we learned that the number of hunters is getting alarmingly smaller year after year and this is a major concern, as it is funds from the Pittman-Robertson act using excise tax from gun and gun accessories to cover the majority of the cost of husbandry of Wildlife. Can you summarize what we learned in this Summit?

CN: Well, first let me tell you a little about how wildlife activities are funded. The Federal Aid in Wildlife Restoration program, known as the Pittman-Robertson Act has funded wildlife activities since 1937 with funds providing activities for the conservation, restoration, and management of wildlife in the United States, providing billions with a capital "B," an incredible amount of money that goes directly to wildlife conservation programs.

JLB: Wow! And if I remember correctly, we were told at the Summit that we must do more than just provide firearm education and range training. Something about needing to provide actual hunting experiences, right?

CN: Yes, firearm safety, education, and range time is still a must for getting into the hunting realm, <u>but we also</u> <u>must do more to offer up learning programs for hunting and getting new people out there. This also must include follow-ups AFTER the fact, such as game cleaning/field dressing courses and field-to-table cooking classes.</u>

JLB: Ca you share how you have been responding to this challenge on a personal basis?

CN: Our NWTF chapter has partnered with the DNR and hosted "Learn to" events such as Learn to Hunt events. But we have also done the follow-up events such as field to table cooking classes, to show new hunters how to cook various wild game. And we depend heavily on Izaak Walton's wonderful outdoor facilities.

JLB: Charita, how long have you been a Sports Shooting enthusiast and how did you get started?

CN: I am primarily a shotgun shooter/hunter/bird hunter and archery deer hunter. I also use a muzzleloader for deer hunting for the two gun seasons. Bird (including turkey) hunting is my passion and what I do most. My husband Andrew introduced me into the crazy realm of hunting and fishing a few years into our dating! I've now been hunting and fishing for pushing 25 years!

JLB: I know that you have got to go back to your WITO event, and I have just two more

questions. I know that you have received some state and national recognition for your work.

Tell us very quickly what those awards were.

CN: They have ranged from our WITO committee earning IN state NWTF best event awards, to national NWTF best event with over 70 attendees awards. I have won state WITO Coordinator awards,

Volunteer of the Year awards, and a national award, the "Annie Oakley Award" which is basically the top WITO Coordinator in the country. I also won the IWLA Shooting Sports Award in 2019. In addition, I have also won a Big Brothers and Big Sisters "Diana Humphrey Award" for our region which is basically an award for a Big Sister who also does amazing things in their community, for their community. Just recently, I recently received the AFP (Association of Fundraising Professionals) Northeast IN Chapter "Outstanding Volunteer Award" which is again, for volunteer work in the community.

JLB: Finally, what is your firearm of choice by brand and gauge used in the field.

CN: Currently, my guns of choice are the Weatherby's. I currently use a 12 and 20 gauge, which are both Weatherby's.

JLB: Charita, it has been a pleasure, as always, chatting with you. Thank you for what you do to advance Sports Shooting and in protection and perpetuation of our nation's wildlife.

CN: Thank you, Jay, and thanks for dropping by today's women's event. Oops! Looks like I'm needed over there. Gotta go.

JLB: By all means. Go girl!

Award-winning marksman Bremen Butler got a first glimpse into her successful future in the basement of her Fort Wayne, Indiana, home. It was there she learned a girl has a place on the range.

"How did I become interested in the sport? It's one of my favorite stories to tell," Bremen said. "My brother had a crush on a girl who was on a rifle team, so my dad, who is the best wingman, set up a pistol range in the basement."

Watching a girl expertly handle a pistol inspired Bremen to join a local marksmanship team. Today, 18-year-old Bremen has a myriad of medals hanging at home. She won the 2021 Civilian Marksmanship Program (CMP) Smallbore Junior National Three-Position Championship and the 2023 Army Marksmanship Unit (AMU) Air Gun Nationals. In 2021, she won a bronze medal in Smallbore and Air Rifle U18 at the Junior Olympics.

"It's hard to estimate how many medals she's won," said her father, Chris Butler. "Last count was about 120. She's won gold, silver and bronze medals, a dozen or so state championships, and a handful of national championships."



Bremen learned marksmanship from her dad, and her skills were further honed by many people who invested in her. She trains

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




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with two-time Olympian marksman Jayme Shipley of iShoot Consulting, and she competes with the Bellmont High School Shooting Club under the coaching of Andrew Werling.

"My coach is definitely the salt of the earth. I've been able to take on the role of athlete coach on the team thanks to him," Bremen said. "He's coaching me on how to coach, which is my dream iob."

Bremen was awarded a \$5,000 CMP Scholarship this year, and she will join the Georgia Southern University rifle team next fall.

"It was very exciting to receive the scholarship," she said. "Georgia Southern University is a young team with a new coach and a fresh start. I'm really excited about getting down there and helping build a new legacy."

Marksmanship not only impacted Bremen's future, but it also changed the way she views herself today.

"Growing up, I put my value in my grades and then in my scores and ability. Now, I can have a bad day, and it doesn't define me," Bremen said. "Just because I didn't do well today, that doesn't change who I am."

Chris said he's watched his daughter remain true to herself as she's grown as a marksman. A defining moment in Bremen's character came on one of her worst days, when her performance during a competition wasn't up to her own expectations. Bremen has a reputation for always leaving the range with a smile, and that day, like

many others, she chose to grin at her failure.

"She walked off the line with a smile on her face and frustration in her eyes and said, 'Dad, you know what makes a bad day good? It makes a good day all that much better.' Now, that's perspective," Chris said.

For Bremen, that perspective stems from her refusal to define her worth by one day's performance.

"Sometimes, "stinking" is all that will come out of a competition, and it makes when you don't "stink", feel good," she said.

As an encouraging father at the range, Chris had a big impact on Bremen's response to successful and not-so-successful competitions. She said she hears his voice guiding and gently reprimanding her, even when he's not there.


"I'll hear his voice in my head when I'm shooting," she said. "I'll argue with him when he's not anywhere near me."

Chris and Bremen have grown close as they've traveled thousands of miles together to competitions.

Prior to each event, Bremen slips the rings off her fingers, stacks them

one by one on Chris' pinky finger, and they pray together on the range.

"It's one of my favorite things," Bremen said.

On May 19, Bremen stood at the Gary Anderson CMP Competition Center in Port Clinton, Ohio, prepping for the Camp Perry Open where she would compete in 3PAR (prone, standing and kneeling) air rifle and smallbore with an Anschutz 9015 ONE air rifle with a 3P conversion kit and an Anschutz 54.30 smallbore rifle. She said she was looking forward to competing with the range's electronic targets and facing the ever-windy conditions at Camp Perry, which add another element of difficulty to the matches.

While there, she talked about the paradox of marksmanship competition.

everything is the same," Bremen said. "At the same time, you're going to be different every time you shoot."

Then, Bremen shares with them her big-picture perspective on competition. "I tell them it's ok to not be the same every time. You can adjust," she said. "There's always another match."

Bremen is 3rd generation member of the FW Chapter IWLA.

They learned that the turkey fan is made up of 18 tail feathers 12 to 15 inches long, toms display the fans to attract females during the breeding season. While juvenile males (known as jakes), have middle tail feathers longer than the rest of the tail feathers, adult males have tail feathers uniform in length.

One of the popular offerings was a Self Defense Class taught by Indiana Conservation Officers.







There were archery classes for both the novice and the more advanced shooters, as the archery ranges were prepared for the day's activities.

There was a session titled Introduction To Fur Trapping

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ITRIED IT

Silk Purse From A Sow's Ear

Like many, I've always dreamed of owning a very expensive rifle designed for precision target shooting, but my budget was found in the "Bargain Basement." I was destined to own an inexpensive standard "off the rack" firearm found in gun stores and sporting good retailers. You know, something cheap.

I reviewed the websites of various manufacturers and concluded that I needed to find an acceptable .22LR rifle that I could purchase for under \$300. After that I intended to dress it up with some cosmetic changes and a decent 6x24 scope.

To find a rifle I wanted I took a trip to ZX GUNS (www.zxgun.com) on Coliseum Boulevard. There I met sales professional Phil who ordered the Savage MK II FV that I decided was my best option to become a respectable marksman. A couple of weeks later, it arrived, and I stopped in and picked up my new "inexpensive" .22LR rifle. The price for the Savage MKII was \$237 plus Indiana tax.



So now I own a new rifle that had the praises of many on YouTube videos. But to be honest, I hated the plastic/mylar stock which looked like something I'd find on a Daisy BB-Gun. My plan was to find a replacement stock, and after seeing numerous videos on YouTube, I knew Boyd's was the company that had what I wanted. After a visit to their website, I realized Boyd's offered a vast selection of stocks for nearly every gun made by the majority of manufacturers in the world.



I then called Boyd's (www.boydsgunstocks.com) via their toll-free number and ordered an "At-One" stock made from pure walnut. Yes, it was \$235 plus shipping which was \$13. The new stock cost nearly the same amount as my rifle which some would call "crazy", but it made the Savage MKII look like a much more expensive firearm. As I waited for UPS to arrive, I pondered adding a decent scope to my new creation. My choice was a HAWKE OPTICS multi-power Endurance model 6x24x50.

When the stock arrived, I checked it out for quality and fit, and it only needed some mild sandpapering inside the stock to reduce some rough edges to allow the barrel and action to fit into this beautiful piece of walnut. Once assembled with my HAWKE OPTICS scope (www.hawkeoptics.com), my inexpensive Savage MKII was now a handsome prince worthy of showing to fellow shooters at our R&P range. Each person who saw and handled my new firearm admitted to its stunning beauty.

And if you're wondering if my new "package" was accurate, I can tell you my most recent score shooting an IBS target at 50-yard



was a score of 249/250. I was one point under shooting a perfect score. So yes, I have a "Frankengun" created from a Savage MKII barrel and receiver, a Boyd's At-One solid walnut stock and a HAWKE OPTICS scope. It's truly "A Silk Purse from a Sow's Ear."


