A Letter From Our Chapter President

The Izaak Walton League of America has been promoting environmental conservation and citizen science for more than a century, advocating strong state and federal policies to protect our natural resources, including the air, water and wildlife. Over the years, the League has played a key role in shaping fundamental laws and policies that help protect our natural resources for future generations.

Back in the 1920s, the Nation was faced with major challenges, including industrial pollution, raw sewage, and soil erosion that threatened our rivers, forests, and other natural areas. The Izaak Walton League has been working tirelessly to safeguard water resources and drinking water across the United States. On MARCH 27, 1924 our Chapter was chartered. In 1926, the League announced a campaign to address water pollution, and in 1927, President Calvin Coolidge commissioned the League to conduct the first national water pollution survey.

The League has also created successful volunteer science programs, such as Save Our Streams and Salt Watch, to monitor stream health and collect data on water quality. These programs provide valuable information for policymakers and scientists, and they serve as a basis for action to protect water quality.

The League's approach to conservation is deeply rooted in outdoor traditions such as hunting, fishing, canoeing, and camping, which our founders enjoyed. League chapters in communities across the country have been – and continue to be – a gateway to the outdoors where generations of Americans can experience nature and learn how to protect the environment.

As we gear up to celebrate our Chapter's 100th Anniversary in 2024, we invite you to be a part of this special occasion. WHAT WAS HAPPENING IN THE YEARS 1920 THRU 1924"

The early 1900s marked a time of significant change, with the end of World War I in 1918 accelerating the wide acceptance of the automobile. By 1921, owning a car had become the norm, but it did not come without challenges and concerns. In August of that year, the Journal Gazette reported that four new gas filling stations were being built in Fort Wayne, bringing the total number of gas stations in the city to 13. Some people had opposed the idea of the first gasoline filling station being erected in Fort Wayne years earlier, fearing it would lower the value of nearby properties.

Prohibition began in 1920, and in November of 1921, Catherine Dinklage became the first woman to be elected to any office in Indiana. She achieved this after the Indiana General Assembly ratified the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution in January 1920, which granted women the right to vote. The Izaak Walton League of America was established in 1922, and the Fort Wayne Chapter was one of the first to be chartered two years later.

During that period, significant political and social changes affected Fort Wayne and all other major cities in the United States. In 1922, the International Harvester Company began constructing a truck factory in Fort Wayne, and truck production started the following year. On October 11, 1922, the Ft. Wayne Nickle Plate Railway was incorporated to serve the International Harvester plant on the east side of Fort Wayne.

During a short period of time, two significant developments occurred which greatly impacted families and the nation's waters. The automobile had become firmly established in the national psyche, and paved streets had already replaced muddy car ruts. The rapid increase in the number of family cars in the city led to the creation of a new department responsible for paving and maintaining all the streets. This, in turn, necessitated the development of a complex underground storm drain system to carry water from the streets to the rivers through pipes.

Another change was the introduction of indoor plumbing and indoor toilets replacing the outside privy. These two developments had a major impact on the pollution of the three rivers of Fort Wayne, which all come together at the city center. Indoor plumbing became popular in almost every home, leading to the generation of waste that needed to be managed. Like many other industrial cities, Fort Wayne chose to use the storm sewer system to carry raw sewage, which ultimately resulted in dumping it into three river of Fort Wayne after each heavy rainfall. It took years for urban sewage lines to be developed to handle sewage separately, making water pollution a national problem.

On August 2, 1923, President Harding passed away suddenly due to a heart attack while on a speaking tour of the western United States. Vice President Calvin Coolidge was at his family home, which had neither electricity nor a telephone when a messenger arrived to inform him of Harding's death.

In 1924, the National Origins Act was passed by Congress, which established strict immigration quotas that prohibited Asians and limited Latin Americans from entering the United States. President Coolidge also signed the Indian Citizenship Act into law, which gave citizenship to Native Americans.

Also, in 1924, two people with Fort Wayne roots were making a name for themselves. Bob Juday participated in the Olympics held in Paris, France, as a high jumper, while Carol Lombard became a well-known movie star in Hollywood. Both were from Fort Wayne.

In 1924, the Fort Wayne chapter of the Izaak Walton League was established.

On the World scene, Hitler was released from prison in 1924 and had started rise to becoming Nazi Führer of Germany.

This was the United States during that era and Fort Wayne's place in it.

RESEARCHERS FIND NEW WAY TO DISPOSE OF PLASTIC

Single-use plastics are a major environmental concern, but now, rather than being disposed of as garbage, used plastic bags from the grocery store could be utilized to carry out a reaction that can detoxify hazardous chemicals. Researchers at Hokkaido University have developed a new method that uses common plastic materials for in place of radical chain reactions instead of potentially explosive compounds. This approach significantly improves the safety of the process while also providing a way to reuse plastic waste such as polyethylene and polyvinyl acetate. This offers new insight into how to dispose of plastic and reduce microplastics.
