BIG THINGS ARE HAPPENING AT THE RIFLE & PISTOL RANGE

The past 30 days have been bustling with activity at the Izaak Walton-Fort Wayne Rifle and Pistol Range, with significant developments in both safety measures and parking improvements.

R&P PARKING LOT REVISIONS:

We've made some noticeable improvements to the parking lot along the dirt berm—it's now more than three feet wider! Our President, Gabe Bowser, utilized his grading equipment to complete this enhancement. In addition, the lot has been leveled to prepare for the addition of crushed concrete, which will cover large stones previously used as bedding that have popped to the surface during the leveling. Please be cautious while walking from your vehicle to the shooting concrete as we work these updates into our schedule and cash availability.





BRUSH CLEARED AT ENTRANCE AND PARKING AREA DOUBLED

Additionally, you may have observed a transformation at the entrance to the R&P Range. Brush invasives along the driveway have been removed, and both sides of the entrance have been cleared and leveled in preparation for future crushed concrete installation. This enhancement will about double the Range parking space; however, the timeline for this project is yet to be determined as it is not included in this year's budget.

We will also need fencing installed to replace the brush along the

Safety remains our top priority, and we've made a groundbreaking change to enhance it. We've installed new red flashing LED "Range Hot" lights, marking the most significant upgrade in years. Previously, orange blinking lights indicated a "Cold" range, which was contrary to shooting

industry standards, where flashing lights signify a "Hot" range. At a recent Board of Directors meeting, a unanimous vote was taken to align our range with national standards. Following the meeting, we ordered high-tech rotating LED lights. Under the expert guidance of chapter president Gabe Bowers and his dedicated maintenance crew, the new lights were installed. Range Safety Officers (RSOs) have been briefed on the change, and the range now operates under industry standards. So, the next time you visit, remember that overhead lights will be illuminated when the range is hot.



A significant portion of our membership utilizes our Rifle and Pistol Range. Therefore, your consideration of a donation would be greatly appreciated, as our annual budget is currently stretched to accommodate all chapter amenities, overhead costs for insurance, and utilities, which we manage with considerable care and scrutiny.

A generous donation of \$5 or \$10 or more can be placed in the appreciation box. We remind that it is also approaching the end of the year, where you can assign a tax free donation with your annual payout on investments and this can be earmarked specifically for our specified chapter use, similar to the generous donations received for the Chapter House renovations that raised over \$20,000. This would allow completing these R&P Range renovations sooner rather than later.

Over the months and years, the Fort Wayne IWLA Chapter NEWS has conducted numerous interviews with fellow Chapter members. This month, however, we are shifting our focus to one of our local Business events supporters. John Arnette, the manager of Hook and Arrow. His generosity has significantly contributed to the



fishing equipment prizes awarded in our Chapter and Community Outreach programs, which aim to highlight the amenities of our Chapter by using our amenities in support of the youth of Fort Wayne to participate in outdoor activities that they might otherwise never experience.

JB: "Good morning, John. Thank you for your generosity and for taking the time to discuss your business and your support of our youth outreach program. Your contributions help introduce young people to the great outdoors—an experience they might not have had otherwise."

JA: Thanks, Jay. We always love to see younger age youth interested in fishing and hunting.

JB: Tell our members and readers a little about HOOK AND ARROW. How did you end up as the owner of Hook and Arrow? Did you purchase the business, or did you start it from scratch and how long have you been in business?

JA: Founded in the 1960s, the original bait store has been a cornerstone of the community of sportsmen for generations. Over the decades, the store has experienced several ownership transitions, each contributing to its storied past and evolving legacy. At one point, the establishment was relocated to the rear of the property, adapting to the changing needs of its customers and the surrounding area. Since 2011, Kirk Heemsoth has been the owner, guiding the store through the modern era. Our main Bow Tech, Jeremy Andrews, has more than 15 years of experience in archery service and sales to the business, offering cus-



tomers unparalleled knowledge and support for all their archery needs. To further enhance our service, we are currently seeking an additional part-time technician to join our staff.

JB: Hook and Arrow sounds like you specialize in two unrelated outdoor sports. How did you pick these two outdoor activities as the core of your Business?

JA: Fishing was the primary business, however with warmer winters archery was added to offset the slower times when ice fishing wasn't so good.

JB: The greater Fort Wayne area has some large "Box Stores," providing everything from groceries to car care products. What is it that draws new customers to your specialty outdoor business? Do you offer something that they can't?

JA: For archery we have Fort Wayne's only indoor archery range. We also custom fit bows and service all make of archery equipment. We are all familiar with fishing and Jeremy is an avid hunter as well and can guide the new archer and seasoned archer with terrific tips and suggestions.

JB: Some may think that Archery and Fishing attract people of a particular age group. Have you found this to be so?

JA: Absolutely not, we have customers of all ages. Retired seniors that use the range for enjoyment and some for honing skills. We have many of the 4H archery groups and clubs come in for service work, new bows, and supplies. Fishing since COVID has increased all ages to seek enjoyment in the outdoors.

JB: Do you have any advice that you would give someone just starting out in the Sport of Archery and is looking to outfit themselves with the basics?

JA: Come and try one out first. So many buy online or in a big box store and have never shot a bow before. Our advantage is, we can fit a bow to you and let you try it out to see if it is something you really want to jump into.

JB: What about fishing? There are so many styles of rods & reels – open-faced or closed, spinning or bait casting, and don't get me started on the seemingly endless styles of artificial lures. Any recommendations for someone just starting in either?

JA: It's natural to feel the allure of top-of-the-line gear but remember: your initial investment doesn't need to be hefty. By starting with something that doesn't break the bank, you leave yourself room to grow without the pressure of a sunk cost. As your skills improve and your preferences become clearer, you'll be in a much better position to decide if a larger investment makes sense for you.

JB: How does a customer find your place of business?

JA: We are at 7536 Winchester Road in Fort



DELEGATE REPORT: 2025 NATIONAL IWLA CONVENTION

Delegate Report

2025 IWLA National Convention

OVERVIEW

We attended the 2025 National Convention of the Izaak Walton League of America (IWLA) in Green Bay, Wisconsin, as appointed delegates of the Indiana Division. The convention brought together delegates from across the country to conduct official League business, vote on policy resolutions, and hear from national leadership, conservation experts, and chapter representatives. We want to thank the Board for this opportunity to gain insight into the culture, history, and future of the Izaak Walton League of America. The event reinforced the strength of the League's mission and provided valuable insight into opportunities for our chapter to expand its role in conservation, education, and community engagement here in northeast Indiana.

KEY ACTIONS AND OUTCOMES

- **Adoption of National Resolution on Data Centers** Delegates approved a resolution clarifying the League's position on large-scale data centers. The resolution addresses concerns over water usage, cooling systems, and environmental impacts. Chapters are encouraged to participate in local hearings and public comment periods when such projects are proposed.
- **Endowment Grants Expanded** The IWLA Endowment Board approved adding renewable energy projects to the list of eligible initiatives for grant funding. This opens potential opportunities for our chapter to pursue sustainable energy-related improvements.
- **Clean Water Advocacy** National staff emphasized the importance of submitting both salt and nitrate monitoring data to the Clean Water Hub. This nationwide database helps track water quality trends, identify problem areas, and strengthen the League's ability to influence state and federal water policy.
- **Chapter Recognition –** The Fort Wayne Chapter was recognized for achieving 110% membership growth in 2024.

OPPORTUNITIES FOR OUR CHAPTER

- **Program Expansion** Chapters across the country are seeing success with public conservation events, school-based volunteer partnerships, and structured conservation education programs. These serve as models we can adapt locally to grow our community presence and impact.
- **Advocacy Engagement** The data center resolution and other policy discussions reinforced how important it is for chapters to engage actively in local environmental decisions, including land use, water management, and habitat preservation.



Partnership Building – Executive Director Scott Kovarovics introduced us to leaders from chapters in Iowa and Virginia with long-running firearms safety and education programs. These contacts are willing to share best practices, and their models could help guide future program development at our chapter.

LOOKING AHEAD

The 2026 National Convention will be held July 16–18 in Bloomington, Minnesota. Future conventions are scheduled for Roanoke, Virginia (2027) and Sioux Falls, South Dakota (2028).

Continued annual delegate participation is strongly recommended to maintain influence in national policy, develop partnerships, and bring back actionable ideas for chapter growth.

The insights from this year's convention highlight our potential to expand programs, strengthen advocacy, and solidify our position as a conservation leader in northeast Indiana.

CONCLUSION

Attending the 2025 IWLA National Convention was both informative and inspiring. The sessions, discussions, and connections reinforced the value of the League's work and the important role our chapter plays. With strategic planning, active partnerships, and continued member engagement, we can significantly increase our local impact in conservation, education, and community service.

We are very appreciative of the Indiana Division – IWLA for naming us delegates and covering our cost of attending the 2025 National Convention IWLA, replacing two Division leaders who could not attend. As new members of Izaak Walton, this gave us invaluable insight into the history, traditions, and current programs of the League.

Thank you for this opportunity.
